What you should know by the end of this level

- Learn French basics and greetings
- Master self-introductions: age, occupation, origin, residence, languages spoken
- Prompt others for self-introductions
- Exchange contact information
- Seek and provide directions
- Understand and follow itineraries
- Navigate public transportation, including buses and subways

Main Grammar topics:
